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Observation

This section is aimed at helping people observe the details of the text: what is written, what words or ideas are repeated and emphasized, the text's structure and how this text fits into the wider context of the book of Romans.

- 1. Read James 4:1-6.
 - a. What stands out to you from this passage?
 - Fights & quarrels arise from evil desires within us (v.1)
 - Extreme language being used here (kill / covet / quarrel / fight) (v.2)
 - Called adulterous people (v.4)
 - Can't be friend of the world & friend of God (v.4)

b. Who is experiencing conflict according to this passage? What 'groups' are at war with each other?

- Horizontally (among people)
- Vertically (between people & God)

c. According to this passage, why is there not peace between people and other people?

- Because of our evil desires we want what we cannot get (v.1)
- Because we don't ask God for things but try to take them from others (v.2)
- Because we have wrong motives when we ask want to serve ourselves (v.3)

d. Why is there not peace between people and God?

Because we want to be friends with the world. We want the "stuff" of the world more than we want God (v.4)

e. What are the two "relationship options" between people and God?

Friend of God or enemy of God

2. Read James 4:7-12.

a. What solution does this passage offer for making peace with God?

- Submit yourself to God (v.7)
- Come near, wash your hands, purify your hearts (v.8)
- Humble yourselves (v.10)
- b. What about making peace with each other?
- Don't slander or judge your neighbor (v.11,12)

Interpretation

This section is aimed at linking the current text to other texts or to the bigger biblical narrative. If you are running out of time, feel free to skip this section.

1. Read Colossians 1:21-23.

a. What is the natural state of people? Alienated from God / enemies in your minds (v.21)

b. What has God done to make peace with mankind? *Reconciled you through Christ's physical body* (v.22)

c. How does God view us as a result of Christ's sacrifice on our behalf?

Holy, without blemish and free from accusation? (v.22)

Do you believe this is true about you? Do you picture yourself as holy, without blemish, and free from accusation in God's sight? Which of these 3 are the most difficult for you to believe? Why?

Application

This section is aimed at helping people apply what we have read in the text to our lives. It is intended to foster more open-ended discussion as people connect the text to their everyday life, and reflect on how it changes the way they think and act.

1. Read Matthew 14:22-33.

a. List all the things which threatened the peace of the disciples in this passage.

- Far away from land (v.24)
- Wind was against them (v.24)
- Saw Jesus walking on water thought he was a ghost (v.25-26)
- Peter saw the wind and began to sink took eyes off Jesus (v.30)
- b. What does Jesus do or say to bring them peace?
- "Take courage it is I, don't be afraid" (v.27)
- Reaches out his hand & catches Peter when he starts sinking (v.31)

c. What waves and storms are threatening your peace right now?
