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Observation

This section is aimed at helping people observe the details of the text: what is written, what words or ideas are repeated and emphasized, the text's structure and how this text fits into the wider context of the book of Romans.

- **1.** Read 2 Kings 4:1-7.
- **2.** Who was the woman married to? And what is the woman's concern?
- **3.** What is Elisha's response to her? What are his instructions?
- **4.** When does the oil run out?
- **5.** What is she told to do with the oil?

Interpretation

This section is aimed at linking the current text to other texts or to the bigger biblical narrative. If you are running out of time, feel free to skip this section.

- 1. Read Exodus 22:21-24 and Leviticus 25:39-43. What laws has God instituted for the Israelites in these passages? How are these laws not being followed in 1 Kings 4:1-7?
- 2. Read Psalm 68:1-6 and James 1:26-27. What people in these passages does God seem to have a special concern for?

- **3.** Read Deuteronomy 10:12-18. What does v18 tell us about God's care for the fatherless, widow and foreigner?
- **4.** Read Ezekiel 22:6-8.

The book of Ezekiel is written during the Jewish captivity in Babylon. What is one of the reasons they are experiencing judgement?

5. With this in mind, what does 1 Kings 4:1-7 this tell us about the state of Israel in this story?

Application

This section is aimed at helping people apply what we have read in the text to our lives. It is intended to foster more open-ended discussion as people connect the text to their everyday life, and reflect on how it changes the way they think and act.

- **1.** How does God's care for the vulnerable challenge you today?
- **2.** When you are in a desperate situation, what is the first place you usually look to for help?
- **3.** The widow in this story accessed God's solution for her situation by consulting God's prophet. We now have God's will and his word in a written, accessible format. How often do you consult God's word to find a way forward in the midst of situations you face?
