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Observation

This section is aimed at helping people observe the details of the text: what is written, what words or ideas are repeated and emphasized, the text's structure and how this text fits into the wider context of the book of Romans.

1. Read 2 Kings 2:1-14.
2. How does Elisha respond each time he's told to stay back while Elijah goes on ahead? How many times does he respond this way? What does this tell us about Elisha?
"As long as the Lord lives, I will not leave you" (v2, 4, 6) 3x (every time). Elisha is persistent in his commitment to following Elijah.
3. What do the prophets in each location tell Elisha? How does he respond to them?
They prophesy that his master Elijah will be taken. He responds that he knows, but he really doesn't want to talk about it, showing that it is distressing for him.
4. When Elijah asks what he can do for Elisha before he is taken, what does Elisha ask for?
For a double portion of his spirit.¹
5. How do Elijah and Elisha cross the river?
First Elijah hits the water with his cloak and the water parts and they walk on dry ground. The second time Elisha hits the water with Elijah's cloak and it parts and he walks over.

Interpretation

This section is aimed at linking the current text to other texts or to the bigger biblical narrative. If you are running out of time, feel free to skip this section.

1. In Exodus 14:10-22.
What does God do to the Red Sea in this passage?
The Lord drives back the waters and they are divided, the Israelites walk through on dry ground.

2. Read Joshua 3:7-9.
Why will the LORD part the Jordan for Joshua the way he parted the Red Sea for Moses?
This is a sign that the Lord was with Joshua in the same way he had been with Moses, and that Joshua is his successor.
3. In 2 Kings 2:14, the water parts for Elisha just as it had for Elijah. What is the significance of this?
God is showing he is with Elisha just as he had been with Elijah, and God has answered Elisha's request to be Elijah's successor.
4. In these accounts in the Old Testament, as Israel's leadership changes hands, what stays the same?
God. He is continually at work providing messengers and leaders throughout Israel's history to bring his unchanging message to His people.

Application

This section is aimed at helping people apply what we have read in the text to our lives. It is intended to foster more open-ended discussion as people connect the text to their everyday life, and reflect on how it changes the way they think and act.

1. In 2 Kings 2:1-14 we learn that Elisha is very persistent to his call by continuing to follow Elijah. How does this challenge you in your persistence to the call of God in your life? Are there areas where you have been tempted to give up? How can Elisha's example of persistence help you?

2. God continues to call his people to proclaim his word in this world. In what ways are you part of this? In what ways have you been neglecting your call?

3. God equips Elisha by anointing him with His Spirit to enable him to do the work as Elijah's successor. How are we, as believers in Christ, equipped for the work we are called to do? How does this encourage you as you follow the call of God in your life?

"By asking for a double portion, Elisha is not asking for twice as much as Elijah had, but for twice as much as any other successor would receive. This is the normal inheritance right of the firstborn, who would "carry the torch" for the family. Elisha is requesting that he receive the status as the principal successor to Elijah." -
