UNDERSTAND THEIR STORY

- 1. Read Php. 4:4-7
 - a. What sort of internal disposition does Paul want to see in Christians? What sort of internal disposition does Paul NOT want to see in Christians?
 - b. How does Paul describe God in this passage?

CONNECT TO HIS STORY

- 2. Read Psa. 46:1-3
 - a. What metaphor(s) does the Psalmist use to describe his fears and worries?
 - b. How does the Psalmist describe God in this passage?
- 3. Read Col. 2:6-7
 - a. What metaphor does Paul use here to describe the ideal Christian life?
 - b. How does this passage describe Christian life?

APPLY TO OUR STORY

The lesson in Php. 4:4-6 is that we can trust God to do right in our lives, and to work in all circumstances for our good, even in the face of big fears and worries.

- 4. Worry and fear are something every single person faces:
 - a. What worries are you facing right now? What fears are you facing?
 - b. What resolutions or outcomes are you hoping for?
 - c. Where do you turn for distraction or encouragement, as you wait for resolutions?
- 5. The antidote for worry and anxiety is to have deep roots in God's Word, in the Christian community, and in Church history.
 - a. So, how deep are your roots? Describe your Bible-reading practice with one word or phrase.
 - i. What scheduling challenges, lifestyle habits, or other commitments get in the way of reading the Scriptures?
 - ii. What Is one thing you can do to grow in this good habit?
 - iii. What is something you can do to help another person read the Bible more often?
 - b. So, how deep are your roots? What sort of connections do you have with other Christians?
 - i. When and where do you spend time with other Christians outside of weekend services?
 - ii. What is one thing you could do/say to help encourage the other Christians you see on a regular basis?

PRAYER Close in prayer for the confessions of the people in your smaller groups: *Adoration: What can you praise God for, as a result of studying this text?*

Confession: What might you need to confess to God as a result of studying this text?

Supplication: What can you ask God for, as a result of studying this text?
