- Word Study: What does it mean, in this context, to "hear"?
  - 31.56 ἀκούω<sup>d</sup>; ἀκοή<sup>e</sup>, ῆς f: to believe something and to respond to it on the basis
    of having heard—'to accept, to listen to, to listen and respond, to pay attention
    and respond, to heed.'1
- Some Scripture passages where the ideas of hearing / seeing / hearts understanding are are fleshed out:
  - a. Deuteronomy 10:12-16; Deuteronomy 29:2-4, 30:1-6
    - i. Israel is called to circumcise their heart so that they can obey the Lord (Responsibility), and Moses also affirms that God is the one who will circumcise their heart!
  - b. Isaiah 5:1-6:10; Jeremiah 5:18-23; Ezekiel 12:1-2
    - i. Isaiah's ministry (Isaiah 6) to speak in such a way that Israel does not see, hear or understand is a ministry of judgment upon them because they have refused to obey (see Isaiah 5)
    - ii. Jeremiah 5:18-23 and Ezekiel 12:1-2 the stubborn and rebellious hearts of Israel have caused them to not see, hear or understand & obey.
  - c. Psalm 115:4-8; Psalm 135-15-18
    - i. Idols have eyes that don't see, ears that don't hear, mouths that don't speak. Those who worship idols become like them.
  - d. Romans 10:20-11:8; 2 Corinthians 3:12-18
    - i. Romans 10:20 11:8 Israel was a disobedient and contrary people they failed to listen / obey and therefore they were hardened
    - ii. 2 Corinthians 3:12-18 a veil lays over Israel's heart, but when someone turns to Jesus the veil is taken away
    - iii. 2 Corinthians 4:1-6 the god of this world has blinded the minds of unbelievers, but God shines the light of the gospel into people's hearts.

**Re: Parables:** "It is naive to say Jesus spoke them so that everyone might more easily grasp the truth, and it is simplistic to say that the sole function of parables to outsiders was to condemn them. If Jesus simply wished to hide the truth from the outsiders, he need never have spoken to them.... he must preach without casting his pearls before pigs (7:6). He does so in parables: i.e., in such a way as to harden and reject those who are hard of heart and to enlighten—often with further explanation—his disciples."<sup>2</sup>
