Annual General Meeting Minutes

Moderator Report - Darryl Kropp

Highlighted the Elder page on Northview's website northview.org/elders and encouraged everyone to check out the monthly Elder Report.

Lead Pastor Report - Mark Burch

Mark briefly explained why we host Annual General Meetings and God's call for us to remember all that He has done for us. He expressed thanks for how our ministries are thriving post Covid and for our Campus Pastors and the work that they are doing.

Mark introduced Pastor Joshua Dool from Praxis Church. Joshua shared their story of starting a church plant in Kelowna, their struggles and how God has been working in and through them. Currently they are praying for a space to meet as they have outgrown their current facility.

Mark highlighted our partnership with Central Community Church at Harrison Hot Springs, Dawson Creek Community Church, and Mile One Mission in Newfoundland and requested that we continue to pray for these plants as well as the Multiply First Nations Ministry in the Parry Sound region in Ontario and Arun and Anjana who will be leading the Punjabi ministry here in the Fraser Valley.

Mark concluded by thanking the church for their support and encouragement.

Stewardship Committee Report - Bruce Belsher, Stewardship Committee Chair Bruce reviewed the Stewardship Committee Report and the intention of what we are trying to do with the estate gift, the building (if we do build), and other net assets.

MOTION 2: The Financial Statements for the year ending June 30, 2022, as reviewed by KPMG, be received as presented



MOTION PASSED

Financial update, as of October 31, 2022:

- Surplus in operations of \$41,000 (deficit of \$48,000 as of Sept.) prior to approved renovations costs and interest income.
- Revenue is \$539,000 under the straight-line budget and \$95,000 better than last year. Expenses are \$579,000 under budget and within \$500 of last year. Last year we had a \$55,000 deficit at this time.
- Approved renovations now at \$459,000 with some smaller bills to come. Any deficit arising from this work is approved at \$500,000.
- Unbudgeted interest is primarily a result of the estate gift. CoE is intending to restrict that value at year end in net assets for new the building, if approved.
- Downes Road is not quite meeting the budget but that is primarily because people are
 moving to our other campuses. We also need to consider that when we ask for special
 projects that may limit our general giving.
- Church Plants:
 - o TriCity 30% over last year
 - o Praxis 100% over last year
- Balance Sheet
 - o Cash is at \$2 million
 - Term deposits, \$14 million, laddered to end July and August 2023 but with \$9 million available in Jan / Feb 2023 for reinvestment
 - o Building Fund Giving \$78,000 YTD now at \$2.68 million unencumbered

Building Project Update - Mark Burch and Darryl Kropp

Our Vision

- A network of churches that share a common DNA and resources.
- Key component is church-based leadership training (Northview Institute).
- Main campus at Downes Road and multiple satellite campuses spread throughout neigbourhoods across the Fraser Valley.

Goal - A campus that could house 6000 - 8000 people in multiple services.

What are we building?

- A 2000 seat auditorium is the obvious addition.
- Renovated old space can help as a wedding / funeral venue and better seating capacity for many midweek ministries.
- More Children's ministry classroom space.
- More available ministry space.

The Cost

- Cost to build \$27 million.
- Cost to renovate the old facility \$3 million.
- Total project cost \$30 million.

Special General Meeting Minutes

Mark briefly presented reasons why it is a good idea to build a larger sanctuary and increase capacity for mid-week missions. In summary:

- 1. To make more and better disciples not just to win conversions but to equip the saints for ministry.
- 2. The Church is still relevant churches that are willing to be counter-cultural are still growing.

Building Update - Bruce Styles, Development Committee Chair

Bruce provided a short update on the building. Layout is essentially the same as previously approved. Some minor sightline improvements have been made. A fly-through of the sanctuary was shown.

Financial Update - Bruce Belsher, Stewardship Committee Chair

Bruce explained how we are already at \$15M in the bank. We still need to raise \$15M.

Fundraising Update - Jonathan Giesbrecht, Executive Pastor of Administration Jonathan presented a brief summary of a survey of some active members of the congregation. Overall, the responses were very positive with the key metric being that 75% of respondents said they'd be willing to support the project.

Before we start we would still like to raise \$5 million dollars. We would like to avoid debt but are not opposed to it if absolutely needed.

Question and Answer Session:

A question and answer period was held.

A key discussion was around the impact of the building on church planting and multiplication. These outward facing programs will continue. We will do "both and". The best way to ensure that this happens is for the building to be completed debt free.

MOTION 2023 Preamble

The cost of the new Worship Centre building and existing building renovation is estimated to be \$30 million. This value includes a reasonable contingency that hopefully will not be needed. Our goal for fundraising is to raise the entire value over the coming years through a large scale ongoing capital campaign. Construction will only begin when the combined total of the internal allocations and pledges toward the new Worship Centre reaches \$20 million. Of that \$20 million target, we have already received or internally allocated \$15 million as of March, 2023.

Motion: The Council of Elders is authorized to begin construction of the Worship Centre based on the current estimate and parameters described in the Preamble.

Motion Darryl Kropp; Seconded by Marvin Klassen.

Motion was carried at 92%

Sean Allison led the congregation in a short time of prayer.

MODERATOR REPORT

As described in Mark's report (see page 10), this has been a good year and there is much to be thankful for as we head into summer 2023. After some tumultuous years, the ministry of the church is back in full force. Attendance is strong and our people are excited to be back worshiping and learning together as a community. God has blessed us tremendously..

All In: After the March 7th Special Congregational Meeting decided to affirm the decision to build a new Ministry Centre, the team has been hard at work both on updating the somewhat dusty plans (see Development Committee report on page 19) and challenging our congregation to be part of the capital campaign. A key part of the decision was that we would only begin building once we had received \$20 million in pledges and gifts to the project. We are excited to have achieved this threshold (almost 75% of the project total pledged or given at this point!) and as a result the planning has moved into high gear. More information to come at the Congregational Meeting.

Budget: Though the Congregational Meeting is an opportunity to celebrate the previous ministry year, it is required by our constitution that we meet to approve our annual budget. The Stewardship report (page 20) describes a strong financial year so far. Though we are not meeting our giving target, we anticipate ending the year balanced or near balanced including the renovation project that has approval for a \$500,000 deficit. For the 2023/24 budget, it is being set at \$10 million, which is almost 9% higher than this year's giving. A stretch target but one that we think is achievable and will allow us to continue ministry in a high inflation environment

New Elders: At the Congregational Meeting, you'll have a chance to meet and affirm two candidates as elders that the Council of Elders (COE) is recommending for affirmation. The Discernment Committee has spent a lot of time getting to know Jim Bird and Dan Burslem through their attendance in COE meetings for the past 6+ months and their participation in the rigorous discernment process. We are excited at the prospect of them joining the COE team which will strengthen our team with quality elders who are part of our Mission Campus.

Continue to uphold the church and its leaders in your prayers. Going into a building project is exciting and also a lot to do as the church gets completely back to speed.

LEAD & SENIOR LEADERSHIP REPORT

Philippians 1:3-4

I thank my God in all my remembrance of you, always in every prayer of mine for you all making my prayer with joy, because of your partnership in the gospel from the first day until now.

When we think of the ministry of the Apostle Paul, we most often think about his hard-driving evangelistic passion, his "get-er-done" mentality, and the many sacrifices (and sufferings) he endured for the sake of the early church. These things are all true. But there was another side to his ministry. His love for the churches (2 Corinthians 11:28), his "fatherly" AND "motherly" care for people (I Thessalonians 2:7 & 11), and his affectionate longing for his disciples (2 Timothy 1:4).

As I reflect on the ministry year we have just finished, I find myself thankful to God on so many levels for the growing sense of connection we are sharing as a church family and the partnership we share in the gospel of Jesus. I'm thankful on so many levels!

I'm thankful for:

- An appetite for the Word of God in weekend services and midweek discipleship ministries
- A growing evangelistic emphasis across our ministries
- Scores of people publicly confessing faith in Jesus Christ through baptism
- A return to full services and pre-covid attendance numbers
- A beautiful sense of community as people linger after services
- A great start to our capital campaign with nearly 75% of the total already allocated or pledged

I find myself echoing Paul's sentiments in Philippians 1 "I thank my God every time I remember you all!".

So what is important for us to reflect on as we look back in thankfulness?

A Strong Post-Covid Return

As I talk with pastors from across the country, I am thankful for the strong post-Covid return that we've seen at Northview. Over the past 12 months our attendance has increased month by month, and by spring we were back to full "pre-Covid" attendance numbers! This is an amazing sign of God's grace toward us. Easter Weekend was a historic high attendance weekend, with 6300 people attending services across our four sites, and around 7000 if you include Praxis, our Kelowna church plant! Praise God!

A Strong Ministry Year in All Departments

As you will read in all the attached reports, each of our ministry departments and age-based ministries enjoyed a vibrant year of ministry together. Particularly encouraging was the response to ALPHA and Questioning Christianity, as seekers and skeptics gathered for spiritual exploration.



A Committed and Gifted Staff Team and Faithful Council of Elders

While we still have a few pastoral vacancies to fill, I am delighted with the pastoral team that the Holy Spirit has assembled here at Northview. We truly have a great team of gifted men and women giving leadership to our congregations. Additionally, our Council of Elders continue to provide dedicated oversight to the operations and theological alignment of the church. I am grateful for these men.

Vision Forward

As we look to the coming months, there are several areas of emphasis on my mind.

"Deep Roots - Abundant Fruit" - Our overarching mission is large enough for all of us to give ourselves to! We exist to be a church where people grow "deep roots" down into God's Word and in Christian community. We are passing the faith along from one generation to the next, and it's exciting to see the hallways jammed with young families. Additionally, we want to see Canada populated with a raft of new gospel-preaching churches, so we will continue to invest strategically in leadership development and church-planting partnerships.

As I mentioned in last year's report, we continue to emphasize our need to grow in prayer and evangelism. I have heard so many encouraging stories from the simple exercise of our 5x5x5 prayer efforts. May God continue to give us a love for people far from God.

As we look to the construction of a new worship centre, we don't want to stall out the growth that God is bringing to Northview, so we are making plans to add a 4th weekend service here at Downes Road. We will move to two Saturday and two Sunday services in early fall. Ideally, 200-250 people from Sunday 9am and 11am would move over to Saturday night to make room for newcomers on Sunday. Would you pray about making this change until we are in our new building?

Finally, we will continue to invite everyone who calls Northview their home church to find a place for ministry and service as part of our volunteer teams. There is no quicker way to feel connected in a large church, than in joining a serving team, and there are areas of ministry for every gifting and personality type! Again, if you are not already serving your church family, will you pray about where God would have you serve in the coming year?

As you read all the reports contained in this package, I hope that your heart is stirred in gratitude to God for His abundant grace to us as individuals, and as a church family. We are living in days that many see as unprecedented in cultural upheaval - but we are also living in incredible times of opportunity for the Gospel of Jesus. That age-old message is still as relevant today as it ever has been. To a broken world that is looking for answers, we can boldly declare, there was ONE who made it possible to return this world and our lives to their intended GLORY - and that is Good News indeed!

MULTIPLICATION REPORT

More & Better Churches

Northview is committed to seeing more and better churches planted locally, nationally, and globally. It is our vision to see dying churches renewed or replanted, new campuses launched, and new people groups reached for Christ. We partner with individuals, churches, and mission agencies to see new churches established in Canada. Each of the projects listed below could have a long commentary but space does not allow. Please visit our website for more stories and periodic updates on these partnerships.

Church Planting Partnerships (Existing/On-going)

Praxis Church Kelowna - Launched in the fall of 2021 this congregation has grown exponentially in the past 2 years. They had over 600 people on Easter weekend, an average spring attendance over 400, and have baptized nearly 30 people this past year. The greatest need for this congregation at this point in time - is to find a permanent location and the right staff for the needs of this growing congregation. Please continue to pray for Pastor Josh (Rebekah) Dool and their team.

Creekside Fellowship Dawson Creek - Is a "re-plant" of Dawson Creek MB that closed its doors seven years ago. North Peace MB Church in Fort St. John is overseeing this project, and we are pleased to partner in prayer and finance. Pray for open doors in this community and for gospel fruit as this church gets established under the leadership of David (Janelle) Hildebrand.

Harrison BC Replant - One year into this replant, there has been great momentum already built! Central Church in Chilliwack oversees this work and Jeremy Isaak is the lead pastor. Northview helped with the renovation costs of the facility and continues to financially support this work in its early years. Again, please pray for gospel effectiveness in this unique community.

Church Planting Partnerships (New)

Christ City Church (Surrey) - CCC plans to start public services this fall (2023) in the Guildford neighborhood of north Surrey. We have the opportunity to partner with them in financial support and prayer. If you know anyone living in this area who might be interested in being part of a new gospel work, please connect them!

Churches Together/City to City Canada - Over the past 3 years Northview has been part of the formation of a new strategic church-planting partnership called Churches Together. This is a church-based, pastor-led network of Canadian churches that want to work together in leadership development and church planting efforts. This year, we began conversations with Redeemer City to City (NYC), seeking to establish Churches Together as an official affiliate of CTC here in Canada. Keep your ears open for updates on this partnership. Brett Landry of Christ City Church is giving ½ leadership to this initiative and NCC is a founding partner church.



Network & Agency Partnerships

In addition to the partnerships above, Northview is providing on-going support to the following agencies and partners:

- Mile One Mission, St John's NFLD vision to plant 50 churches on the "Rock".
- Mission Hill Church, Calgary building local partnership toward planting in Alberta.
- Multiply funding partnerships for First Nations Ministries and Punjabi Church Planting.
- C2C Collective agency support for church planters assessment, training, and oversight.
- Churches Together/City to City Canada in start-up phase.

Church Planting Pastor

We are hopeful that we will be able to fill the church planting pastoral role in this ministry year. This position has been vacant for 2 years now, and we are asking God for wisdom in how best to move this agenda forward - please pray with us.

LEADERSHIP DEVELOPMENT REPORT

It has been a busy year in Leadership Development. With the new MABL (Master of Arts in Biblical Leadership) set to begin this fall, the LD team (particularly Trent Erickson and Doug Berg) has been working countless hours to prepare the curriculum and, ultimately, have it approved and accredited by Northwest Seminary and MB Seminary. Thirteen candidates applied to Immerse for 2023/24. In all, we have invited six of the applicants to join Immerse. Two candidates are from partner churches (Christ City and Maple Ridge Community), and the remaining four will join the Northview team.

This past year, the Ministry Apprenticeship Program introduced its fully accredited C.C.F. (Certificate in Christian Foundations). Thanks to the leadership of Danae Friesen and Joshua Scott, the inaugural year of the revamped M.A.P. was a great success. We anticipate 6-8 new students joining our apprenticeship program this fall.

There has been a positive response to the Ecclesia Journal of Practical Theology. We have published two issues and plan to release a new issue every six months. This fall, we are also planning to introduce the Ecclesia Podcast which will serve to complement the Journal. Arielle Hlady, our department admin assistant, is the creative brainchild behind this new and exciting project. The goal is to invite various Journal contributors to discuss their articles in greater depth.

Please pray for our current students as well as the new cohort that will be joining us in September. There is still much work to be done as we work toward revising the Immerse MDiv curriculum; pray especially for Trent and Doug as they continue their efforts in this area.

DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE REPORT

Downes Road Campus

After a three year pause, we are excited to be moving forward with the construction of the new Worship Centre. We have had numerous conversations around the ideal design and function of the project on Downes Road and have made changes to our original site plan. These changes include a reworking of the entrance and flow of traffic from the existing building to the new worship centre and have focused on making the site feel more like one building/facility. With valuable input from consultants, the final adjustments and updates to the floor plan will be submitted for review and permitting so we can move forward early in the new year with construction.

Along with the building design changes, we are considering options that will serve us well in long term energy cost savings. We are engaging with engineering consultants in the field of solar energy for power/energy conservation and geothermal (GSHP- ground source heat pumps) for long term cost effective climate control.

Some preliminary work may begin this summer/fall, such as the deconstruction on the "bubble" as well as an initial parking lot shift in preparation for the excavation of the building foundation. Thank you in advance for your patience and cooperation during the construction process.

Mission Campus

Mission Campus is once again reviewing the growth in their community and considering how best to meet the needs for the congregation with the existing facilities. Purpose for the old sanctuary is under review and discussion about renovation or rebuilding is being considered.

Praxis- Kelowna

Last December, there was a building opportunity for this campus but unfortunately that option went away. Currently, this campus is still looking for a suitable site for this growing congregation where they can have a permanent home or at best, secure longer term reliable tenancy.

Cyrus Centre

Cyrus Centre has expressed the need for a larger or multiple site option for their growing ministry to the youth in our city. We are in conversation around how we can partner and support this need with new location options.

STEWARDSHIP COMMITTEE REPORT

Interim Financial Statements - April 30, 2023

Giving

Giving reached \$7.79 million, below the straight-line budget by \$208,000 (2.6%) but ahead of last year by \$265,000 or 3.5%.

Mathematical projections, based on last year's giving pattern, suggest reaching a target of about \$9.2 million, up \$66,000 from March's value which means giving is growing over last year's value each month. Good news indeed but shy of our giving target by \$400,000.

Praxis's giving continues to be strong at 40% more than last year.

Details per site are below. Although Downes Road is down over last year by \$345,000 there has been some shift in attendance from Downes to the other sites. Most notably East Abbotsford with a corresponding giving shift.

Interest income, tentatively internally restricted to the proposed building project, reached \$464,000, shown just below the Northview surplus (deficit) line.

Expenses

Expenses reached \$7.09 million, up over last year's \$6.68 million. Only the Admin budget is running ahead of budget due to a few lines going slightly over anticipated costs - specifically some audio repairs/upgrades, merchandise costs and our logo changes, and added legal/accounting expenses regarding the release of TriCity. The underspending has resulted from less students enrolled in Leadership Development programs, some planned Church Planting spending which hasn't yet happened, and almost \$400,000 less in compensation paid due to hiring or vacancy lags. Those vacancy/hiring lags will be discussed further in the budget for next year.



The YTD Operating Surplus generated is at \$709,000.

Other Items (below the Northview Surplus (Deficit Line of \$709,000):

- Tithing of \$250,000 to Mile One Mission using the internally restricted funds from the estate gift received last year. In order to allocate those funds, a loss must be incurred as shown. This expenditure is the first drawdown related to the tithe, with \$750,000 more to go.
- Interest income of \$464,000 which is intended to be put towards the building project allocation.
- Façade renovations of \$579,000, which there is approval to incur a deficit of up to \$500,000 for the completed work per the approved budget a year ago by the membership.

If we start with the Northview surplus of \$709,000 and ignore the tithe of \$250,000, and the interest income (to be allocated to the building) we arrive at a surplus position April YTD even by including the façade renovation. God, through the faithfulness of his people, is again blessing us with surplus even when we don't meet the giving target.

With two months to go it is anticipated that we will remain close to a balanced position by year end even when including the renovation work per the math above.

The final section to review is the church plants. One might wonder how the church plant section of the Income Statement can turn a healthy surplus into a large deficit. That deficit was always intended and now materializes into our books with the successful launch of TriCity Church and the separation of assets.

The simplistic way of looking at it is that Northview sold an asset worth more than \$3.0 million for the price of the outstanding debt, \$1.31 million. Northview, "the ever-shrewd church planter," paid down the loan with the Canadian Conference and then allowed TriCity to pay for that outstanding balance with an IOU. TriCity is aware that we may require repayment of the debt in order to pay for the building.

The Praxis surplus of \$167,000 will be assumed to not form part of our operations as we will provide that surplus back to Praxis when needed. This is consistent with how we treated TriCity Church.

Balance Sheet

Highlights include:

- 1. Current assets, most of which is cash and term deposits, are down almost \$1 million from June 30, 2022.
- 2. Offsetting that drop in current assets is the mortgage receivable of \$1.3 million, representing TriCity's debt owed to us instead of the Conference.
- 3. The building project growing by \$16,000 to \$522,0000, reflecting the capitalization of permitting costs.
- 4. The absence of TriCity land, building, equipment, and accumulated depreciation to the "sale" of those assets to TriCity.
- 5. Internally restricted net assets dropping by a net amount of \$508,000 due to the tithe to Mile One Mission of \$250,000, the Praxis surplus, and the gift of TriCity accumulated surplus.

Giving to the building project has increased by \$46,000 in April and now totals \$2.84 million in cash and \$522,000 in costs incurred meaning total giving to the project has reached \$3.31 million.




Budget Report

This report will highlight the primary variances from the current year's budget with rationale and other notable information for the areas noted below plus a comment regarding the giving target.

Giving


We are building a budget based on \$10m in giving next year. This is an increase of over 4% from last year's target and 8-9% higher than the giving projection for our current 2022/23 year. This is a significant stretch, but one we believe is both achievable and allows us to do the things we believe God is calling us to. The main driver for this stretch is to accommodate the significant inflationary pressures we've been feeling, primarily in personnel.



Expenditure Overview

The overall percentages of our budget are highlighted in this chart. In contrast to most churches, our personnel reflects quite a low percentage (47.6% as compared to the average 55-60% for most churches) of our overall budget, and our Multiplication is a substantial amount - that percentage includes our Leadership Development costs, Missions, support to partner agencies like our denomination, as well as all our church planting partnerships.






Personnel

The greatest increase we are seeing this year compared to last year is around personnel, and the bulk of this increase is simply the substantial inflationary pressures we've been seeing around us. Our commitment to taking care of our staff team has resulted in a policy that grants our staff salary increases that align with the cost of living. The increase just to maintain the cost of living with our current staff team accounts for almost the entirety of the increase in budget.

We are also adding a few positions to our team to fill out some felt needs for part time and full time roles, in Care and Seniors, kitchen, facility support, and administrative roles. Offsetting this cost is budgeting for vacancy lag. Over the past few years, it's become evident that with our increasing size, there is more of a potential to have positions open/vacant, even just for a few months. These position vacancies quickly result in us coming under budget by year-end.

The cost of living increase, plus a few new positions, minus the vacancy lag, results in a total budget of \$4.76 million for personnel, representing 47% of our expenditure budget.





Building

There are four primary drivers of the increase in our building cost. First is an increased budget for utilities. We found that we underestimated and under budgeted for this year already. The utility cost is about \$25k higher than last year or around 20%. There is increased budget for custodial service due to inflationary pressures passed on by our custodial contractor. Third, insurance costs have increased, due to significant increase in the premiums last year, and anticipated increase this year of around 15%. The final driver is that we've allocated funds for all the costs around the capital campaign in the building line. These include costs for consultant fees, fundraising material, etc.

While there are multiple upward pressures, there are two significant reductions. Our amortization expense has decreased with fewer capital purchases this year and a projected reduction in purchases for next year, and we've reduced the budget for any renovation projects around the current facility.

So, while utilities, insurance, custodial, and our capital campaign are pushing this line upward, we are reducing capital acquisitions and any renovations next year to lower the increase overall.

Campuses

Much like the Downes building budget, the primary drivers of the reduction we see in the campuses are decreased amortization expense - specifically with East Abby and Mission. Both of those campuses have seen their declining balance move down more rapidly than usual because of fewer capital expenditures required. With East Abbotsford moving into their new space, there's been little to



no need for any new capital spending. Mission Campus is also still enjoying a space that is relatively new. At the same time, there is a discussion about the 2, 5, and 10 year plans for the campus and how that could impact their buildings and capital asset needs.

Multiplication

When we first started developing the budget, we built it around a flat giving number of \$9.6m, the same as our current year. However, in order to accommodate the inflationary pressures, Multiplication took a big hit. We had to cut around \$400,000 out of church planting and Leadership Development to balance that budget. That was something we really did not want to see happen. This budget sees us actually growing our Leadership Development as we take on additional Immerse Pastoral Interns - growing our program that develops and trains pastors and leaders.

Should we have a significant shortfall in our giving, the church planting expenditures would likely be one of the first relief valves to maintain a balanced position. Translation, if our giving doesn't hit our target, we may not be able to do the church planting projects that we're really excited about.

Praxis

While Praxis is separate from our Northview Budget, it is important to know what their revenues and expenses will form part of our financial statements. For the upcoming ministry year they are proposing a balanced budget based on a giving target of \$638,000. Praxis has roughly \$400,000 in cash, which would cover any sort of shortfall, but it is hoped that balance be saved for the future to form part of a down payment for a site of their own.

Summary

Our giving target is a stretch, but that stretch is to accommodate the inflationary pressure we've been feeling, primarily in our personnel budget, and allow us to still maintain our multiplication projects and initiatives. If our giving doesn't match our targets, the church planting expenditures will be what we'll have to reduce first.

GOVERNANCE COMMITTEE REPORT

It has been highlighted numerous times this year that it is Northview's 43th year of serving Abbotsford and the surrounding area, as a gospel centered church reaching out into the community with the saving knowledge of Jesus Christ. I am personally thankful for those men, women, and families that started Northview and for all of those who have served the Church body over the last 43 years. My prayer is that we will continue the vision that they started in 1980 and continue to reach out in the community, the surrounding area, the Province, and Canada. Northview's vision has grown, and we thank all of you for your continued support in that vision.

In the governance structure of Northview, committees are appointed by, report to, and make recommendations to the Council of Elders (COE). The COE reports to members through the Moderator, so reports of committees at general meetings of members, such as this one, are for information only. Governance in a church setting leads to some very interesting discussions. With our current multi-site model and multiplication focus, which has been approved by the congregation, it adds another layer of complexity to those Governance discussions.

Some of the tasks reviewed and completed by the Governance Committee this year include:

- TriCity Church's move to self governance. This process has been completed and TriCity
 Church is now independent as of January 1, 2023. I would like to specifically thank Jonathan
 Giesbrecht and Lorne Welwood for their work on this. Northview is currently holding the
 mortgage for TriCity Church, which will be highlighted in the Stewardship Report.
- Yearly review of Northview's Constitution and Bylaws. There are no revisions at this time.
- Yearly review and updating of Northview's Operating Guidelines. This time around there have been some minor changes on wording and clarifying of some sections.
- As a COE, we do an internal Elder evaluation of each other and this was completed last year. It was a good process for the Elders, and I believe it has helped us function as a group.
- We have been moving forward on a Multisite Governance and Management Model, this has taken longer than I expected, and we hope to have a final document for review by the COE in the fall of 2023.
- Northview continues to receive regular requests for assistance with church plants, and because of Northview congregants' generosity we have been able to consider those requests. We approach these asks with prudence and are currently working on a church planting and governance strategy document for the urban and rural requests that keep coming in. When these documents are completed, this will be presented to the COE to review and approve. Please pray for wisdom regarding these requests.
- We are developing a comprehensive policy list for Northview. Our goal this year is to review
 and update existing policies, develop new policies as needed and retire those that are no
 longer relevant. Some examples of policies that we have reviewed are, Care Fund Policies,
 Drug and Alcohol Policy (ie. direction if someone is on one of our campuses under the
 influence of drugs or alcohol) and Diaper Changing Policy for Imagine Ministries. There are a



number of policies under discussion / development. Such as a Security Policy, Financial Investment Policy (ie. how to process legacy gifts, gifts of stocks and bonds etc. and how to facilitate/engage those giving avenues). When developing / reviewing these policies we reach out to church members who have expertise in those areas for input.

How are we doing?

After more than a year of work and preparation to become an independent entity, we finally received our charitable status in December, and have since been working out all the kinks since going independent as of January 1st! While this didn't make much of a difference for our weekly gatherings or ministries, it did have a huge impact on our administrative organization and structures. We are so thankful for Northview's support over the past 6+ years, and Northview's continued support as we learn how to operate independently! We are especially thankful to Northview for continuing to support our ministry by acting as our mortgage lender for our building, saving us a significant amount of money with the rising interest rates.

Independence truly is a reason to praise God for his faithfulness and grace in the planting and growth of our church as it puts us in a position to seek God's vision for us, the future of our ministry and respond with conviction and action. It's good to be out on our own. That's what should happen when you grow up.



It's strange to think about it, but this time last year we were just emerging fully from COVID restrictions, which means that this ministry year has been back to normal to such an extent that it



actually feels normal and it's hard to remember the days of gathering restrictions (thank you Lord!) Our weekly average last year was about 300 people including kids and now we welcome around 500+ people including kids. Our goal is not simply to have more people in the building on Sunday morning our goal is to ensure that everyone is effectively discipled in Christ - which means we need more leaders, more teachers and an effective strategy to multiply ourselves as individuals and as a church. While we are still in the early days, we as Elders have been thinking and praying about multiplication at a church level.

What are we excited about?

While the biggest point of excitement for us this past year was our independence, we're especially excited by how God continues to grow His Church! We are excited for Men's Bible Study starting in the fall and for more discipleship opportunities in the coming year.



Evidences of Grace

We have many reasons to be thankful and we see continued evidences of grace within our midst. People are continuing to grow in Christ-likeness, which has enabled two of our staff pastors to be able to take a much needed rest, to be able to continue to teach and minister to our people well. Ben returned from his sabbatical in April, and Matt is currently on sabbatical, after over 10 years in ministry without a period of rest, and is looking forward to allowing the Lord to grow him and equip him for this next season of ministry. Our women's ministry continues to grow. More women leaders are being raised up, which is resulting in an increased ability to disciple and care for more women in the church. Imagine Ministry Report

Over the past year Imagine has seen growth and our program has seen changes to meet the needs of our families. Currently, we have 32 participants that are attending on a regular basis. Throughout the year we have been able to run several events for the families in our program including a Christmas respite night and a spring Family Night.

We are excited to have had the opportunity to expand into a second classroom at the 11 AM service. This has given us the flexibility to run a separate service for participants 12 and over every other week on Sunday. Discipleship Report

The mission of our Discipleship department is to help people become deeply rooted followers of Jesus by providing opportunities for them to Gather, Grow and Go. We finally have a full complement of people to help us accomplish this mission! After many months of being short-staffed, we were excited to hire Jesse Wilson as the Community Groups Pastor, and Justin Havinga as the Community Group Ministry Assistant. As we begin to organize and rebuild the Community Group Ministry at Northview, we also want to thank Sean Hildebrand and Alex Martin for their help in the interim; they facilitated missional group coaching sessions for almost all community group members, and individual coaching meetings with community group leaders.

This year we added significant discipleship resources for people who are pre-believers and new believers through the Questioning Christianity course, and the Alpha course. We're grateful for all the teachers, organizers and table facilitators who committed to meeting new people and engaging with their questions during these courses! Several people made decisions to follow Jesus, and many have been impacted by thoughtful faith discussions. We also hosted three baptism services this year, and celebrated 126 people making a public declaration of their faith.

Our Men's and Women's Bible Studies (both Northview-produced & Precept-produced curriculum) continue to help people become more deeply rooted followers of Jesus; many men and women are stepping into new areas of leadership in small group leading or large group teaching. This spring we also hosted eight Theology, Life and Culture (TLC) Classes to help people apply biblical knowledge to real life situations in work, parenting, relationships, evangelism, retirement, conflict resolution, and in understanding ideas of sexuality and gender. We also organized a parent discipleship event called, "How to Talk to your Kids about Doubt."



We are grateful that the Spirit calls people into relationship with the Father and the Son as we read, discuss and pray through His word. We know that any 'success' we experience is a result of His work through His Word and His people.

Please pray for our team as we write curriculum for 2023-2024 and brainstorm new Discipleship strategies; we're hoping to reboot a podcast, organize more youth parent discipleship events, and creatively communicate our age-based Discipleship Pathway so that all of you know how Northview is helping people become deeply rooted followers of Jesus through Children's Ministry, Middle School, High School, and Northview Young Adults. We're praying especially that Northview members would feel both the call and the confidence to be small group leaders (in our Bible Studies, Questioning Christianity and Alpha) and community groups leaders, so that we can connect pre-believers, new believers and new attendees to meaningful discipleship relationships at Northview.
