## GATHER + GROW

**Deeply rooted by being formed through the word of God.**

This biblically based content overlaps with the current weekend teaching at your Northview campus and positions you, as a group, to be shaped by studying Scripture.

- **Pray.** Acknowledge God's presence + ask for his help to hear what he's saying through the text.
- **Share a takeaway from the May 2/3 sermon.** "Is there something the Holy Spirit highlighted for you?"
- **Facilitate a brief study of 2 Cor 5:1-10**

Start the conversation with an 'Icebreaker.'

**What is one of your biggest dreams? What is one thing you'd like to accomplish or experience or see before you die?**

### **Study Step 1: Read 2 Corinthians 5:1-10**

Familiarize yourself with this section of verses. (Note characters, commands, key/repeated words!)

### **Study Step 2: Understand Their Story – (With answer key + leaders notes)**

Ask *observation questions* to understand what the author is communicating to the original audience.

- **Take a look at 2 Cor 5:1-5**
  - Read verse 1 - What is the metaphor Paul uses here and what are the contrasts he shows?

- *Reflection question: Think back at last week's imagery of a treasure in jars of clay. How does this connect?*
  - Read verses 2-4. What is the present struggle for Christians with regards to their body?
  - According to verse 5, whose work is that? What has God done with it?
- **Take a look at 2 Cor 5:5-10**
  - Twice Paul, shares how we ought to be impacted by the truth of verses 1-5.
  - What is the constant struggle/warring desires? How do we relate to this tension, (v.7)
  - What is our aim? What further motivation does Paul present in verse 10?
- *Reflection question: How would the rest of Scripture shed light on verse 10? For example, will God judge even sins you have confessed to him and that he forgives? How does verse 10 resonate with you?*

Take these observations into the next step below

### Study Step 3: Connect To God's Story –

Ask questions to understand how this text fits in the larger gospel story.

**We've selected a few connections that are here to a) expand on the content of the passage and/or b) clarify the content of the passage.**

- **For further study on your own:**

- "We live by faith not by sight"

- **Read Hebrews 11:1-16** What is faith? (v 1-2) What do we understand by faith? (v 3) How do the first 3 verses of Hebrews 11 tie in to 2 Cor 5:7? What does faith "accomplish" for the believer? What does it make possible? (v 6) What motivates those with faith? (v 10, v 13-15) Why is God not ashamed to be called their God? Is this lesson challenging or convicting you? What would it look like for you to live by faith and not by sight?

- "So that what is mortal may be swallowed up by life." The idea of God defeating death and "swallowing up" death through life appears in several places. Read and reflect on the following passages:

- **Read Isaiah 25:1-9.** What is prophesied in this passage? What will happen in the future? What will people say "in that day"?

- **Read 1 Corinthians 15:50-58.** Paul reflects on Isaiah 25:8 and applies it to the future. What does Paul say will happen? When will this transformation take place? In light of this future transformation, how does Paul encourage them to live? How does Paul's teaching here relate to his teaching in 2 Corinthians 5?

## Step 4: Apply To Our Story

Ask questions to discern what God is telling us to do with the help of the Holy Spirit.

- Where in your life do you feel the tension that Paul describes? What part of your earthly body causes you to groan? Why is that?
- Again Paul encourages us toward confidence. How confident do you feel currently in your walk with the Lord? What fuels your confidence? What dampens it?
- Where are you at with the aim to please God? Do you feel frustrated, or excited? What is an area you feel like it is easy to strive to please God? What area challenges you the most?
- Spend some time praying to the Lord, thanking him for the Spirit's guarantee. Lift each other up in prayer, especially in the areas that you feel weak to please the Lord. John Piper once said: "Prayer will only make sense when you realise that life is war?"

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- Pray for those far from God that you personally know, by name.
